All Staff are to carry out self-testing at home on Sundays and Wednesdays and report results through both the NHS and School reporting systems. Ensure that pupils, staff and other adults do not come into School if they have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms (a new continual cough, a temperature in excess of 37.8, or a loss of, or change in their normal sense of taste or smell). Ensure anyone developing those symptoms during the School day is sent home. You should self-isolate at home from the day your symptoms started, or from the day you receive a positive test result if you do not have any symptoms. You can end your self-isolation on the sixth day of self-isolation following 5 full days isolating and two negative rapid lateral flow tests taken on consecutive days. The self-isolation period remains 10 full days for those without negative results from two rapid lateral flow tests taken a day apart. There is no need to take a PCR test. 	Ensure all staff and parents are made aware. Public Health England is clear that routinely taking the temperature of pupils is not recommended as this is an unreliable method for identifying coronavirus (COVID-19).	Medium				
				 If a child who tests positive at school (boarder or day pupil who becomes ill during the day) is awaiting collection, they 						



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				 will be moved, if possible, to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door or outside, weather permitting, depending on the age and needs of the child, with appropriate adult supervision if required. Ideally, a window should be opened for ventilation. If it is not possible to isolate them, we will move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people. If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should use a separate bathroom if possible. The bathroom will be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before use by anyone else. If a child needs direct personal care until they can return home, a fluid-resistant surgical face mask will be worn by the supervising adult or the child may be asked to wear one. If a risk assessment determines that there is a risk of splashing to the eyes, e.g. from coughing, spitting, or vomiting, then eye protection will also be worn. Refer to safe working in education, childcare and children's social care settings, including the use of personal protective Equipment (PPE). In an emergency, call 999 if someone is seriously ill, injured or their life is at risk. Boarding Provision All three Senior Boarding Houses will continue as normal enabling boarders to attend School. Boarders' Health Checks and Procedures Boarding Houses will continue to carry out daily LFD tests under the control of the duy staff. Any boarder showing Covid symptoms during the day will return to their House and the Medical Centre will oversee testing and their medical needs until they can be collected or moved to an isolation room. Access to our remote, online education programme will be made available to all boarders who are self-isolating and who are well enough to continue studies. School Workforce Following the reduction in the prevalence of coronavirus (COVID-19) and relaxation of shielding measures, we expect that staff will attend School. Staff have the option to wear face coverings as they wish. Staff who are at high risk People are no longer being called clinically extremely vulnerable. Some people who were previously considered clinically extremely vulnerable. Some people who were previously considered clinically extremely vulnerable are still considered at high risk from COVID-19 To maintain the high level of protection, you should get vaccinated. Evidence indicates that 2 doses of COVID-19 vaccine provide very effective protection against hospitalisation. It usually takes around 2 – 3 weeks for the body to develop its protective response To maintain this high level of protection through the coming winter a booster vaccine should be accepted when offered. The booster programme is open to every adult who has had a second dose of the vaccine at least 3 months ago You should continue to follow the same guidance as the general public on staying safe and preventing the spread of COVID-19. 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Inadequate hand and respiratory hygiene leading to spread of Covid-19 virus	Infection spread leading to serious respiratory illness, death	All building users, visitors/ parents, contractors/ maintenance personnel	High	 Asking family and friends to take a rapid lateral flow antigen test before visiting you Ask home visitors to wear face coverings Avoiding enclosed crowded spaces Children and young people should attend education settings unless their clinician has advised otherwise. Everyone must wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running water or use hand sanitiser after any contact with someone who is unwell. The area around the person with symptoms must be cleaned with normal household disinfectant after they have left to reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people. Refer to COVID-19: cleaning of non-healthcare settings guidance. Younger children will continue to be helped to clean their hands properly, given the risk of ingestion. Hands must be dried properly to prevent infection and drying out. Pat dry rather than rub to avoid discomfort. The 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach will continue. Everyone will be reminded to sneeze into a tissue or sleeve NEVER into hands and to wash hands immediately after (as above). Used tissues will be put in a bin immediately - all waste bins to be lined and should be emptied regularly. As with hand cleaning, we will ensure younger children are helped to get this right, and all pupils understand that this is now part of how school operates. When changing children, and where the child can understand, ask the child to turn their head to the side during the changing process. Inadequate health and safety arrangements for staff and pupils	Infection spread leading to serious respiratory illness, death	All building users	High	 General School Wide Measures In order to continue to reduce the risk of transmission the following measures will be put in place until at least February half-term: The legal requirement to wear a face covering no longer applies. However, pupils and staff may still wish to wear a face covering, although this is not expected. This will be reviewed again if the recommendation changes. Children over 11 should wear face coverings on School Transport. All adults on School transport should wear face coverings. Children under the age of 3 should not wear face coverings. Whole School assemblies will not be allowed. Assemblies will take place in Year Groups. Visitors to the site will be kept to a minimum and will, where possible, not be given access to buildings. Parental attendance at external sports fixtures will be allowed but no Match Teas will be offered. Parents will not be permitted to watch sports held in the Sports Hall or Swimming Pool. 		Low

This is only permitted where the room is occupied and doors must be closed once the group has left the room. At the end of the day, all doors to all rooms must be closed for fire purposes. Pupils and staff will be asked to bring in their own water bottles. Measures for break and lunchtimes School meals and tuck will continue to run as normal. Cleaning throughout the day - non-healthcare settings where no-one has symptoms of, or confirmed COVID-19 We will: Continue the cleaning schedule that ensures cleaning is generally enhanced and includes more frequent cleaning of rooms / shared areas that are used by different groups, frequently touched surfaces being cleaned more often than normal. Kitchens and communal canteens It is very unlikely that COVID-19 is transmitted through food. However, as a matter of good hygiene practice, anyone handling food should wash their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds before doing so. Food business operators should continue to follow the Food Standard Agency's (FSA) guidance on good hygiene practices in food preparation, Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point (HACCP) processes and preventative practices (prerequisite programmes (PRPs)).

Ensure suitable handwashing facilities are available including running water, liquid soap and paper towels. Waste Waste does not need to be segregated unless an individual in the setting shows symptoms of or tests positive for COVID-19. Dispose of routine waste as normal, placing any used cloths or wipes in 'black bag' waste bins. You do not need to put them in an extra bag or store them for a time before throwing them away. Where support staff capacity is available, we will consider using this to support catch-up provision or targeted interventions.
